Tales of the Gauchos

Constance Backhouse Buckland (1893-1973), nacida en Argentina y fallecida en Inglaterra, narra recuerdos de su infancia aventurera en la Estancia San Blas en la Patagonia. Constance pertenecía a una familia irlandesa que llegó a la Argentina a mediados del siglo XIX e hizo una fortuna a través de su abuelo, Eduardo T. Mulhall, fundador del diario THE STANDARD de Buenos Aires. Beatrice, la madre de Constance se casó con Frank Buckland, un inglés que administraba la estancia del padre, y Constance y sus hermanas vivieron en la Estancia San Blas del abuelo con su isla y puerto privado hasta la quiebra del negocio familiar cuando se mudaron a la estancia de los Buckland en Punta Rubia. Las niñas fueron educadas por institutrices europeas que se animaban a la aventura y que respetaban y acompañaban durante largos períodos de tiempo. Las niñas vivieron rodeadas de la naturaleza inhóspita pero singular de las ventosas tierras del sur, acompañadas por institutrices, sirvientes nativos y de distintas nacionalidades, gauchos del lugar y por sobre todo caballos, ovejas y mascotas de todo tipo, incluyendo un ñandú que las seguía por la casa. Sus recuerdos están mechados con música, canciones, viajes a Europa para acompañar a la abuela y visitar a los parientes Buckland en Torrington y sus estadías en la quinta Lambaré de los Mulhall en Buenos Aires.

The Last Cowboys at the End of the World

Durante siglos, el ganado que había en los asentamientos españoles del siglo XVI en el Cono Sur de Sudamérica, poco a poco, se fue escapando. En libertad, los animales se multiplicaron hasta convertirse en millones de bovinos y caballos criollos que vagaban libremente por la pampa argentina, esa vasta región con praderas inmensas que desciende desde los Andes hasta el desierto de la Patagonia. En el siglo XVIII, criollos de origen español, indígenas y africanos vagaban por esa región,

capturaban el ganado, atrapaban y domaban a los caballos. A estos nómadas de la pampa se les llamaba gauchos, un vocablo derivado de las lenguas quechua y araucano que significa figura huérfana y solitaria. Con tan solo un lazo y unas boleadoras, un gaucho a pie podía capturar a un caballo y derribar a un toro embravecido. El gaucho asistía en primera fila al maravilloso espectáculo de la naturaleza: presenciaba las acometidas de los corceles salvajes, la fuerza de las tormentas y el estruendo del ganado en estampida. Cada noche, bajo el cielo estrellado, vivía tan libre como un pájaro en el cielo.

Gauchos e Institutrices

Although as much romanticized as the American cowboy, the Argentine gaucho lived a persecuted, marginal existence, beleaguered by mandatory passports, vagrancy laws, and forced military service. The story of this nineteenth-century migratory ranch hand is told in vivid detail by Richard W. Slatta, a professor of history at North Carolina State University at Raleigh and the author of *Cowboys of the Americas* (1990).

It is an enjoyable reading for all ages and gives us a glimpse of how people used to live in Argentina and Europe at the start of and during the First World War.

This literary investigation of identity construction in twentieth-century Welsh Patagonia breaks new ground by looking at the Welsh community in Chubut not as a quaint anomaly, but in its context as an integral part of Argentina. Its focus is on historicising and problematising the adoption of the so-called 'Welsh feat' as foundational narrative for Chubut and its settler colonial implications in the larger settler colonial formation that is Argentina, where indigenous re-emergence seems to be leading the way towards real pluralism. Exploring the understudied period immediately preceding the celebrated turn-of-the-century revitalisation, *Memoir and Identity in Welsh Patagonia* presents four memoirs written in Welsh and Spanish by Welsh Patagonian descendants, read against the grain to foreground the tensions, dissonances and ambivalences emerging from the individual narratives. The study then probes the romanticised stereotype of the Welsh descendant so prevalent in media representations, in order to describe a broader, richer panorama of what it means to be a Welsh descendant in Patagonia in a modern Argentine context.

Aconcagua is the highest mountain in the Americas and the tallest mountain in the world outside of the Himalayas. Located in the Andes Mountains of Argentina, near the city of Mendoza, Aconcagua has been luring European mountain climbers since 1883, when a German geologist nearly reached the mountain's summit. (A Swiss climber finally made the ascent in 1897.) 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Idle Days in Patagonia

Well past her prime, 45-foot pilot cutter *Mischief* carried H.W. Tilman, along with an ex-dairy farmer, two army officers and a retired civil servant, safely the length of the North and South Atlantic oceans, and through the notoriously difficult Magellan Strait, against strong prevailing winds, to their icy landfall in the far south of Chile. The shore party spent six weeks crossing the Patagonian ice cap, in both directions, returning to find that their vessel had suffered a broken propeller. Edging north under sail only, *Mischief* put into Valparaíso for repairs, and finally made it home to Lymington via the Panama Canal, for a total of 20,000 nautical miles sailed, in addition to a major exploration first all here related with the Skipper's characteristic modesty and bone-dry humour, and many photographs.

The Jewish Gauchos of the Pampas

Salvaging Empire probes the historical roots and current predicaments of a twenty-first century settler colony seeking to control an uncertain future through resource management and environmental science. Four decades after a violent 1982 war between the United Kingdom and Argentina reestablished British authority over the Falkland Islands (Las Malvinas in Spanish), a commercial fishing boom and offshore oil discoveries have intensified the sovereignty dispute over the South Atlantic archipelago. Scholarly literature on the South Atlantic focuses primarily on military history of the 1982 conflict. However, contested claims over natural resources have now made this disputed territory a critical site for examining the wider relationship between imperial sovereignty and environmental governance. James J. A. Blair argues that by claiming self-determination and consenting to British sovereignty, the Falkland Islanders have crafted a settler colonial protectorate to extract resources and extend empire in the South Atlantic. Responding to current debates in environmental anthropology, critical geography, Atlantic history, political ecology, and science and technology studies, Blair describes how settlers have asserted indigeneity in dynamic relation with the environment. *Salvaging Empire* uncovers the South Atlantic's outsized importance for understanding the broader implications of resource management and environmental science for the geopolitics of empire.
