At times moving, uplifting, funny, and raw, their testimonies illuminate the power dynamics between parents and providers, the value of supportive partnerships and mutual trust, and the need for culturally responsive services.

Caring for Children With Neurodevelopmental Disabilities and Their Families

Current estimates indicate that approximately 2.2 million people are incarcerated in federal, state, and local correctional facilities across the United States. Medical care and treatment costs represent the largest portion of correctional budgets, and estimates suggest that these costs will continue to rise.
