Excerpt from North American Fauna, Vol. 23: Index Generum Mammalium, a List of the Genera and Families of Mammals; January 23, 1904 The present index, which differs materially from previous ones in containing much information besides the name, authority, and place of publication, was undertaken in connection with the systematic work on mammals carried on by the Biological Survey, in order to collect for convenient reference not only the names given in previous indexes, but also those which had been overlooked or which had been published since the appearance of these works. Its object is to bring together all the generic and subgen'eric names of mammals, both living and extinct, which have been proposed since 1758, and to furnish such data of a bibliographical nature as to facilitate finding when and where each name was published, and to what group it was applied. It gives, so far as possible for each name, (1) authority, (2) date of publication, (3) order and family, (4) reference to original place of publication, (5) important secondary references, (6) variations in spelling, (7) type or included species, (8) locality of type species, (9) indication of pre occupation, with cross reference to names, if any, proposed to replace them, (10) a statement (if published) of the part of extinct animals as the skeleton, skull, teeth, etc. - which constituted the type specimen.
