I Write with the Right

Alejandro (9 years) goes to school half days and otherwise "plays" on the finca, the coffee plantation. He points towards his older sisters, "They cannot read and do not go to school." Libia (14 years), also a sibling, explains, "They harvest coffee instead." Thousands of Panamanians of the indigenous Ngabe-Bugle peoples travel every year to Costa Rica to harvest coffee, mostly temporarily. They come from difficult circumstances: over ninety percent of this group in Panama lives in extreme poverty. A majority of the migratory children (of all ages) work on the coffee fields. This book sheds light on the world of indigenous Ngabe-Bugle children, migrating and working from Panama on the Costa Rican coffee fields. It demonstrates and describes their experiences. All children agree that Costa Rica is beautiful or *preti*, as they say. Simultaneously they speak of violence, fears, and deprivations. These children are both vulnerable and resilient. Their ideas do not always coincide with adult professionals or international human rights law. *I Write with the Right* illustrates children's consciousness of internationally codified rights and the reality on the ground. It furthermore demonstrates what actors and factors influence their realities and its implications for international human rights law, policies, and legal theory. Immunizing the World's Children by 1990

Pura (pronounced poor-ah) Vida (pronounced veed-ah) literally translates to Pure Life. Mae (pronounced my) is Costa Rican slang for friend or pal (like our "dude"). Pura Vida Mae is the story of a serene and mellow young iguana by the name of Daniel who enjoys living his life and relaxing in the sunshine. As he goes about his day, he learns that a great many other animals in the jungle do not share his fondness for a laid-back life. Some of these animals question him, and others simply go about their business. Daniel does have some very nice friends, though, and they share his love for an uncomplicated life of peace. His friends do not all look like he does, but they do have a great deal in common. Daniel can be himself with his friends, and they love each other for that. The message of this story is to love yourself and each other for who you are. I intend for this story to teach that gentle lesson. I began to write Pura Vida Mae after my first visit to Costa Rica, where I fell in love with everything about this amazing country. This place made a huge impression on me as a nature and wildlife enthusiast

and conservationist as well as an artist; the love of life in all of its forms so apparent here. "Pura Vida" is the national greeting of the Costa Rican people. It means everything from "hello" and "nice day" to "good-bye" and "safe trip."

The Forever Forest

Early childhood development outcomes play an important role throughout a person's life, affecting one's income-earning capacity and productivity, longevity, health, and cognitive ability. The deleterious effects of poor early childhood development outcomes can be long-lasting, affecting school attainment, employment, wages, criminality, and social integration of adults. The State of the World's Children 2002

The 2005 edition of UNICEF's *State of the World's Children* focuses on how poverty, conflict and HIV/AIDS threaten the idea of childhood as a period of time for children to grow and develop to their full potential. In several regions and countries, some of the gains made since the adoption of the Convention on the rights of the child in 1989 are in danger of reversal. The rights of over 1 billion children are violated by being severely underserved of one or more of the basic services required to survive, grow and develop.

The State of the World's Children 1982-1983

The 2005 edition of UNICEF's annual report examines the key issues which threaten the welfare of children around the world, using the concept of childhood as the state and condition of a child's life. The Convention on the Rights of the Child, adopted in 1989, offers a new definition of childhood based on human rights; yet for hundreds of millions of children the promise of childhood is threatened by poverty, armed conflict and HIV/AIDS threaten their survival and development. The report examines these three major threats in detail, and offers a comprehensive agenda of action to combat them. It concludes by calling on all stakeholders, including governments, donors, international agencies and communities to reaffirm and recommit to their moral and legal responsibilities to children.
