The Wonderful Wizard of Oz has been enchanting audiences since it was first published in 1900. While many fans may know the work only by its movie counterpart, the world L. Frank Baum built within the books is much more elaborate. Since the more recent publication of Gregory Maguire's *Wicked: The Life and Times of the Wicked Witch of the West* and the Broadway play of the same name, fans have had a rekindled interest in Baum's original works from which the retellings draw heavily. Anyone interested in fantasy, magic, and silliness is sure to love this American classic. L. Frank Baum (1856-1919) is one of the most recognized and beloved children's authors, though he is often recognized for only one of his many stories. The Wonderful Wizard of Oz is easily his most popular work, though Baum actually wrote 13 sequels in Oz. His writings consist of practically every genre: Baum wrote 55 novels in total, 82 short stories, more than 200 poems, as well as scripts, and other miscellaneous writings. Interestingly, many of his non-Oz works were published under pseudonyms. Baum made many attempts to bring his work to stage and screen, but the most successful productions were not made until after his death.

Further Adventures in Oz

During his lifetime, L. Frank Baum wrote 14 novels and 6 short stories about his magical land of Oz. All of these works are contained in volumes 1 and 2 of this bestselling series. When he passed away in 1919, the title of "Royal Historian of Oz" passed to others in an unbroken succession of authors. The first 40 titles they wrote are now referred to as the official Oz Canon. The remaining 25 have long been out of print, with few exceptions. Only 9 are now available for the first time in a collection for those whose love of Dorothy and the magnificent land she visited always wondered 'what happened next?' The wait is over, in a one of a kind edition which includes the titles "The Royal Book of Oz"

The Woggle-Bug Book

The Royal Book of Oz (1921) is the fifteenth in the series of Oz books, and the first, by Ruth Plumly Thompson, to be written after L. Frank Baum's death. Although Baum was credited as the author, it was written entirely by Thompson. Beginning in the 1980s, some editions have correctly credited Thompson,[1] although the cover of the 2001 edition by Dover Publications credits only Baum. The original introduction claimed that the book was based on notes by Baum, but this has been disproved. Baum's surviving notes, known as "An Oz Book" [2] are known from four typewritten pages found at his publisher's, but their authenticity as Baum's work has been disputed. Even if genuine, they bear no resemblance to Thompson's book.
