Excerpt from Critical Notes on Old Testament History: The Traditions of Saul and David The publication of the present studies is due to the liberal-minded editors of the Jewish Quarterly Review in whose hospitable pages, always open to biblical research, they first appeared. They began with the attempt to make an independent investigation of early Hebrew history to the time of David, and, taking their rise in an examination of a number of detailed points some years ago when the Encyclopaedia Biblica was in course of preparation, form the continuation of the preliminary article on the Composition of 2 Samuel, published in the American Journal of Semitic Languages, April, 1900. After a discussion of certain historical questions in 2 Samuel (section i, J. Q. R., July, 1905), I have dealt independently with Saul and the narratives which lead up to his rise. The evidence appeared to show that many of the older narratives which have gathered around the first king of Israel were not trustworthy, and that in their present form they are the result of certain processes of redaction, the character and relative age of which can usually be determined (sections ii - iv, J. Q. Jr., October, 1905, January, April,

1906). The oldest of the traditions had points of contact with the old stories of Joshua and with certain features in the patriarchal narratives. Next, although several write is have recognized the importance of Kadesh in early traditions, and admit the possibility of a distinct movement into Judah, an independent study seemed to show that the traditions in question belonged to a specific group which pointed to a movement into both Israel and Judah (sections v - vi, J. Q. R., July, October, 1906). By this time the stage was reached where the reconciliation of the evidence with modern critical views of early Israelite history became impossible. Excerpt from *Critica Biblica: Or Critical Notes on the d104 of the Old Testament Writings* The Eng/dopaa'z'a Bz'blz'ea, of which I am one of the editors, is an honest attempt at a brave forward movement in the critical study of the Bible. It appeared to be time for scholars to throw off the fatigue not unnatural at the close of a great period, and to encourage one another to co-operate in the cause of progress. The plan of the work referred to was partly the late Prof. Robertson Smith's, partly my own (submitted to him very near the close of his last illness). Co-operation between scholars of different schools was indeed indispensable, and it may be hoped was morally as well as intellectually profitable to all parties but, speaking especially for myself, it soon became more and more evident that at least one half of the book ought, if possible, to consist of what is commonly called advanced criticism. The literary, political, and religious history, the archazology, geography, and natural history of the Old Testament presented numerous doubtful points, and a searching examination of the basis of received views seemed imperatively called for. Holding that the truest truth was not too good for the best students, and that merely to put forward clearly and learnedly the average opinions of scholars would have been to ensure the propagation of countless errors, I carried on (with all the help that I could get) the work of revising the basis of the existing Old Testament science I seemed to feel that with an expanded point of view, and with new as well as old methods at my command, small indeed would be my merit if I could not discover many fresh facts. Toward this end, he proposes a post-critical paradigm shift that recenters study around God. The intent is to do for Old Testament studies what N. T. Wright's *Christian Origins and the Question of God* series has done for New Testament studies. Bartholomew proposes a much-needed holistic, narrative approach, showing how the Old Testament functions as Christian Scripture. In so doing, he integrates historical, literary, and theological methods as well as a critical realist framework. Following a rigorous analysis of how we should read the Old Testament, he goes on to examine and explain the various tools available to the interpreter. He then applies worldview analysis to both Israel and the surrounding nations of the ancient Near East. The volume concludes with a fresh exegetical exploration of YHWH, the living and active God of the Old Testament. Subsequent volumes will include *Moses and the Victory of Yahweh*, *The Old Testament and the People of God*, and *The Death and Return of the Son*.

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The New Testament

Studies in the Text of the Old Testament offers to the English-speaking world the combined introductions to the first three volumes of Dominique Barthélemy's *Critique Textuelle de l'Ancien Testament*. CTAT was the culmination of the Hebrew Old Testament Text Project, launched by the United Bible Societies in 1969 and carried out by an international team of Old Testament textual critics under the leadership of Eugene Nida. As Emanuel Tov has stated, these introductions form "an almost complete introduction" to the textual criticism of the Hebrew Bible. They hold an important place in Old Testament textual criticism and can stand alone, apart from the detailed discussions of the textual problems found in the volumes. Part one surveys the history of OT textual criticism "from its origins to J. D. Michaelis" and presents the Hebrew Old Testament Text Project and its goals. Part two describes in detail the background of the modern versions that the HOTTP took into account in its work. Part three, the most extensive section, discusses the textual witnesses—the different forms of the Hebrew text and the contribution of the

ancient versions. As his concluding program for a critical edition makes clear, the groundbreaking work of Barthélemy and the HOTTP served as the basis for the new Biblia Hebraica Quinta, which began publication in 2004. UBS undertook the HOTTP to offer Bible translators help in applying the results of textual criticism to their work, but there is no doubt that many others will benefit from this work, as well as the other volumes in the series "Textual Criticism and the Translator."

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A Syllabus of Old Testament History

This two-volume set is part of a growing body of literature concerned with the history of biblical interpretation. The ample introduction first situates key players in the story of the development of the major strands of biblical interpretation since the Enlightenment, identifying how different theoretical and methodological approaches are related to each other and describing the academic environment in which they emerged and developed. Volume 1 contains fourteen essays on twenty-two interpreters who were principally active before 1980, and volume 2 has nineteen essays on twenty-seven of those who were active primarily after this date. Each chapter provides a brief biography of one or more scholars, as well as a detailed description of their major contributions to the field. This is followed by an (often new) application of the scholar's theory. By focusing on the individual scholars and their work, the book recognizes that interpretive approaches arise out of certain circumstances, and that scholars are influenced by, and have influences upon, both other interpreters and the times in which they live. This set is ideal for any class on the history of biblical interpretation and for those who want a greater understanding of how the current field of biblical studies developed.

1 Samuel is Volume VII of The Forms of the Old Testament Literature, a series that aims to present a form-critical analysis of every book and each unit in the Hebrew Bible. Fundamentally exegetical, the FOTL volumes examine the "structure, genre, setting," and "intention" of the biblical literature in question. They also study the history behind the form-critical discussion of the material, attempt to bring consistency to the terminology for the genres and formulas of the biblical literature, and expose the exegetical process so as to enable students and pastors to engage in their own analysis and interpretation of the Old Testament texts. Antony Campbell's valuable form-critical analysis of 1 Samuel highlights both the literary development of the text itself and its meanings for its audience. A skilled student of the Hebrew scriptures and their ancient context, Campbell shows modern readers the process of editing and reworking that shaped 1 Samuel's final form. As Campbell's study reveals, the tensions and contradictions that exist in the present text reflect a massive change in the way of life of ancient Israel. Samuel, the first prophet, here emerges to preside over the rise of Saul, Israel's first king, to be the agent of Saul's rejection, and to anoint David as Israel's next king and the first established head of a royal dynasty. The book of 1 Samuel captures the work of God within this interplay of sociopolitical

forces, and Campbell fruitfully explores the text both as a repository of traditions of great significance for Israel and as a paradigm of Israel's use of narrative for theological expression.
