Transference of orientalist images and identities to the American landscape and its inhabitants. especially in the West—in other words, portrayal of the West as the "Orient"—has been a common aspect of American cultural history. Place names, such as the Jordan River or Pyramid Lake, offer notable examples, but the imagery and its varied meanings are more widespread and significant. Understanding that range and significance, especially to the western part of the continent, means coming to terms with the complicated, nuanced ideas of the Orient and of the North American continent that European Americans brought to the West. Such complexity is what historical geographer Richard Francaviglia unravels in this book. Since the publication of Edward Said's book, Orientalism, the term has come to signify something one-dimensionally negative. In essence, the orientalist vision was an ethnocentric characterization of the peoples of Asia (and Africa and the "Near East") as exotic, primitive "others" subject to conquest by the nations of Europe. That now well-established point, which expresses a postcolonial perspective, is critical, but Francaviglia suggest that it overlooks much variation and complexity in the views of historical actors and writers, many of whom thought of western places in terms of an idealized and romanticized Orient. It likewise neglects positive images and interpretations to focus on those of a decadent and ostensibly inferior East. We cannot understand well or fully what the pervasive orientalism found in western cultural history meant, says Francaviglia, if we focus only on its role as an intellectual engine for European imperialism. It did play that role as well in the American

West. One only need think about characterizations of American Indians as Bedouins of the Plains destined for displacement by a settled frontier. Other roles for orientalism, though, from romantic to commercial ones, were also widely in play. In Go East, Young Man, Francaviglia explores a broad range of orientalist images deployed in the context of European settlement of the American West, and he unfolds their multiple significances.

Discourse means you have a range of statements that provide a language with the way of talking about something. It provides a language with a way of representing knowledge about a particular subject matter at a particular given historical juncture.

"All social practices entail meaning and meaning shapes and influences what we do---all the practices that we have possess a discursive aspect to them" (Hall, The West and the Rest, 1992, Pg. 291). Discourse is about the production of knowledge through language---that there are rules and practices that produce meaningful statements and that regulate discourse in particular historical periods.

Discourse constructs the topic. It defines and produces the objects of our knowledge.

Discourse never consists of just one statement or just one action or one source of information. The same discourse that characterizes a way of talking or thinking in a state of knowledge at any one time can cross a range of texts that may lead to different forms of conduct within different institutional sites within a society.

Objects have no real meaning outside discourse---the way one talks about them and acts upon these ideas.

It is impossible to determine what the meaning of an object is outside of how it is used.

Physical things and actions exist but they only take on meaning and become objects of knowledge within discourse---how they are talked about and how they are put into practice and become institutionalized.

Meaning only comes through discourse (objects + practice) produces knowledge--- a way of thinking about and acting on things that then become institutionalized.

The power accorded to discourse is similar to that given to language by other cultural theorists---the power to define how the world is categorized and perceived.

Foucault believed individuals give meaning to objects and events.

Foucault argued that portraying an object or an event will reflect journalistic interpretation and ways of thinking and seeing

Foucault rejected the reduction of the relationship between knowledge and power to one solely confined to class interests--- preferring to believe that other social forces are in operation as well (Hall, 1997, Pg. 48).

It is discourse, not the subjects who speak it, which produces knowledge. Subjects may produce particular texts, but they are operating within the limits of the episteme, the discursive formation, the regime of truth, of a particular period and culture. Indeed, this is one of Foucault's most radical propositions: the subject' is produced within discourse.

"This subject of discourse cannot be outside discourse, because it must be subjected to discourse. It must submit to its rules and conventions, to its dispositions of power/knowledge. The subject can become the bearer of the kind of knowledge which discourse produces. It can become the object through which power is relayed. But it cannot stand outside power/knowledge as its source and author" (Hall, 1997, Pg. 55).
