When dealing with deductive arguments, do not start with the conclusion

When making a deductive argument avoid picking out your conclusion ahead of time.

Are the premises true?

Is the premise sufficient to justify the conclusion?

Inductive arguments take on many forms.

Generalizations: where arguments involve making a general claim based on limited or specific evidence.

Analogies: drawing conclusions about one situation based on what you know about another
