Parallel zum Drama dieser historischen Expedition erzählt Ransmayr die Geschichte eines jungen, in Wien lebenden Italieners namens Mazzini, der mehr als hundert Jahre später zum besessenen Sammler aller hinterlassenen Zeugnisse und Dokumente der »Payer-Weyprecht-Expedition« wird und schließlich ins Eismeer aufbricht, um als Passagier eines norwegischen Forschungsschiffes die Entdeckung des »Franz-Joseph-Landes« nachzuvollziehen. Aber im Verlauf seiner Recherchen zur polaren Entdeckungsgeschichte gerät Mazzini immer tiefer in die arktische Gegenwart und verschwindet schließlich, ein Schlittenreisender, in den Gletscherlandschaften Spitzbergens.

Efraim's Book is the sophisticated, offbeat novel about the peculiar society of post-World-II Berlin. Its hero George Efraim is a Jewish reporter who has fought for the British on the Italian front and lost both parents to Auschwitz. He returns home to Berlin in 1962 for the first time since the war to investigate the wartime disappearance of his editor's daughter, only to begin writing a novel, which helps him "to embark on a certain arrangement of signs with the help of which I hope to chart my position." Like the great German novels of Günter Grass and Heinrich Böll, Alfred Andersch's Efraim's Book grapples with the legacy of World War II and the Holocaust in all its horror and sad humanity. ## The Terrors of Ice and Darkness

Along with his later recollections of the event, Jünger also shares his

#### American Cold War Culture

These articles deal with the functioning, and malfunctioning, of the Carreira da India, the round voyages made between Portugal and its possessions in India that began after Vasco da Gama had opened up the route round the Cape of Good Hope in 1497-99. On such voyages was the Portuguese colonial empire built, and these studies illustrate the conditions under which they operated - the ships, the crews, their navigation and their cargoes. For instance, details are given of the medicines carried on board and the hospital established at the way-station of Moçambique in an attempt to combat the perennial

# The Register

They may map the Earth's underside rather than its surface, suggest turning the layers of the Earth inside out, link the biological physiology of living inhabitants and the physiology of the land, or trace a journey oriented not by the Euclidean space of GPS but by points of life. These speculative visualizations can constitute the foundation for a new kind of atlas.

# The Star-crossed Renaissance

The published work of Claude Levi-Strauss over the last three and a half decades has established him as one of the world2s most innovative anthropologists. Yet throughout this period he was maintaining a full taching commitment in Paris. The pieces in Anthropology and Myth illustrate (in his own words) 2the efforts, the tentative advances and retreats and now and again the achievements of a thought process during some thirty-two years that amount to a large propotion of an individual life and the span of a generation2. Levi-Strauss used to the lecture theatre as a workshop in which to try out and develop new ideas, and many of the familiar themes of his books will be found here: analysis of myth and ritual, totemism, kinship, marriage and social structure. Offering a unique glimpse of the genesis of such subjects throughout his teaching career, this book provides a sketchbook of the themes painted elsewhere in larger, more finished form, and thus forms a document of vital importance for the history of anthropological thought.
