The Conquest of New Spain is the first-person narrative of Bernal Dýaz del Castillo (1492-1581), the 16th-century military adventurer, conquistador, and colonist settler, who served in three Mexican expeditions; those of Francisco Hernýndez de Cýrdoba (1517) to the Yucatýn peninsula; the expedition of Juan de Grijalva (1518), and the expedition of Hernýn Cortýs (1517) in the Valley of Mexico; the history relates his participation in the fall of Emperor Moctezuma II, and the subsequent defeat of the Aztec empire. In the colonial history of Latin America, The Conquest of New Spain is a vivid, military account that establishes Bernal Dýaz del Castillo "among chroniclers what Daniel Defoe is among novelists". Bartolomý de Las Casas, whose Indian-native histories emphasized the cruelty of the conquest; and the histories of the hagiographic biographers of Hernýn Cortýs - specifically that of Francisco Lýpez de Gýmara, whom he believed minimized the role of the 700 enlisted soldiers who were instrumental to conquering the Aztec empire.
