Seven Pillars of Wisdom is T. E. Lawrence's memoir of his involvement in leading a portion of the Arab revolt against the Ottoman empire during World War I. The empire had joined the side of Germany and the Central Powers in the war, and Britain hoped that a successful revolt would take the empire out of the war effort. Britain had also promised the Arabs that, if they were successful, England would recognize a single Arab state. Lawrence convinced the Arab leaders, who had historically not shown a willingness to work together, to join forces in supporting Britain's strategy in the area. His memoir is part travelogue, part philosophy treatise, and part action novel. It details his movements and actions during his two year involvement, his relationships with the various Arab leaders and men who fought with him, and his thoughts—and doubts—during that time. It's a gripping tale made famous by the

movie *Lawrence of Arabia*, and one that Winston Churchill called “unsurpassable” as a “narrative of war and adventure.” The manuscript of *Seven Pillars of Wisdom* has a rich history. Lawrence finished his first draft in 1919 from his notes during the war, but lost most of it when changing trains in England (it was never found). The next year, he started working on a new version from memory that ended up being sixty percent longer than the original. He then edited that version (although it was still a third longer than the original draft), finishing it in early 1922, and had eight copies of it printed to give to friends so they could review it and offer editing suggestions (and to prevent a repeat of losing his only copy). About this time he re-enlisted in the service, but friends convinced him to work on a version he could publish. In 1926, he had a first edition of approximately 200 copies published that included 125 black-and-white and color illustrations from sixteen different artists. The first edition lost money, and it was the only edition published during his lifetime. This edition uses the first edition text and includes all 125 of the original illustrations, including both endpapers. This book is part of the Standard Ebooks project, which produces free public domain ebooks.

and carry out attacks on the Ottoman forces from Aqaba in the south to Damascus in the north. Many sites inside the Wadi Rum area have been named after Lawrence to attract tourists, although there is little or no evidence connecting him to any of these places, including the rock formations near the entrance now known as The Seven Pillars. T.E. Lawrence also known as Lawrence of Arabia originally published *Seven Pillars of Wisdom* in 1922 and it still remains a classic amongst readers of all kind but in particular, readers of history, military, world war I, and biographies & memoirs.

When T. E. Lawrence's *Seven Pillars of Wisdom* first appeared in 1922 it was immediately recognized as a literary masterpiece. In writing his extraordinary account of the Arab Revolt of 1916-1918 and his own role in it, T.E. Lawrence sealed his place in history and legend as Lawrence of Arabia. Force and Fanaticism

Territory north of that stark line would go to France; land south of it, to Britain. In 1946, after many years of intrigue and espionage, Britain finally succeeded in ousting France from Lebanon and Syria, and hoped that, having done so, it would be able to cling on to Palestine. Arabian Sands

Il 26 gennaio 1915 alcuni reparti della quarta armata ottomana, comandati dal generale tedesco Kress von Kressenstein, attaccarono il canale di Suez. Iniziava la Grande Guerra anche in quello strategico scacchiere. In un primo momento gli Alleati organizzarono una difesa passiva del canale, limitata al respingimento degli attacchi nemici ma dopo la fine della fallimentare campagna di Gallipoli, per la quale l'Egitto era stato una base di fondamentale importanza, la difesa di quel settore divenne attiva. Nell'agosto del 1916, infatti, le forze Alleate si lanciarono al contrattacco, sbaragliarono le forze turco-tedesche in Sinai e giunsero alle porte della Palestina. Nella tarda primavera del 1917, arrivò a Rafah il Distaccamento Italiano composto di trecento bersaglieri e un centinaio di carabinieri reali. Gli uomini, guidati dal maggiore D'Agostino, presero parte alla terza battaglia di Gaza, difesero valorosamente il settore di Khan Yunis ed entrarono, a seguito del generale britannico Allenby, trionfalmente a Gerusalemme. Dal 1918 furono impiegati nelle retrovie in servizi di polizia, vigilanza dei depositi, presidio degli snodi ferroviari, smistamento e sorveglianza dei prigionieri. Contestualmente agli eventi bellici, un'intensa attività diplomatica fece da sfondo all'azione del distaccamento. La vexata quaestio, alimentata dall'acceso spirito di competizione italiano nei confronti della Francia, riguardava l'ostinata volontà di Roma di tutelare i propri interessi in Palestina sostenendo la fine del protettorato transalpino in Terra Santa. Di contro, l'evidente ostracismo anglo-francese dovuto all'accordo segreto Sykes-Picot che, già nel maggio 1916, aveva decretato la spartizione di quella regione.
