The court-sponsored epic works that have survived provide an ongoing literary testimony to the cultural and social concerns of court society from its earliest recorded history until its demise at the end of the nineteenth century. This study examines the idealized images of women and sexuality that have pervaded Javanese

and Balinese culture and provides insights into a number of cultural practices such as sati or bela (self-immolation of widows).

For this religious message he employed the form of the kakawin, the court poem or *kāvya* of Java, and in imitation of Indian *nxxlels* he clad his message in the tale of the hunter, Lubdhaka, who despite his sinful existence was able to share the bliss of heaven through the simple fact that - by accident and unawares- he fulfilled the essential elements of the ritual. It is not known whether the poet's efforts met with success in Java itself; his poem did, however, remain known in Bali, the preserver of so many items of medieval Javanese culture. Not only have Balinese priests laid down and elaborated in religious works the ritual which he proclaimed, but the poem has also inspired Balinese artists to make paintings, in former centuries as well as this. 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Some Aspects of Asian History and Culture

Essentially the following commentary on the contents of the Nāgara-Kertāgama has been made up from notes by former editors of the text together with remarks, criticisms and digressions by the present author. As Kern, Krom and their contemporaries were especially interested in dynastie history and archeology their notes on those subjects are legion, and as a result of their studies on many points a communis opinio has been reached. The argumentations which led up to this end are not reproduced in the present edition. The interested reader is referred to Krom's great books: *Oud-Javaansche Kunst* and *Hindoe-Javaansche Geschiedenis*. It is to be expected that before long the results of Krom's life-work will be made accessible for English readers by De Casparis. On the other hand cultural history, religion, economics and sociology have been rather neglected by the first editors of the Nāgara-Kertāgama. The present author has done his best to remedy that omission. The reader will find that the greater part of the following commentaries is concerned with those subjects. The contemporaneous minor texts and the charters that are published, translated and annotated in the present book in the same manner as the Nāgara-Kertāgama have been chosen almost exclusively for the valuable information on social, economic and religious conditions in the 14th century Majapahit realm that is afforded by them.

Kunst und Kultur in Bali

The present "Literature of Java, Catalogue Raisonné of Javanese Manuscripts" is a publication of the Library of the University of Leiden. It is no. IX of the series "Catalogues Manuscripti" published by this Library, and it is made available to the public by the Royal Institute of Linguistics and Anthropology. Originally the work was only meant to be a sequel to Dr H.H. Juynboll's "Supplement to den Catalogus van de Javaansche en Madoereesche Handschriften der Leidsche "Universiteits-Bibliotheek" in two volumes. The second volume appeared in 1911. It soon became clear, however, that this was the opportunity to publish an English Catalogue which could be used as an introduction to the study of Javanese literature more easily than the previous Dutch catalogues could. It is a matter of fact that Dr Juynboll and his predecessors wrote their catalogues with the intention of providing information on Javanese literature in general, and for several decades their books did render excellent services to students of Javanese civilization. The differences in structure between the older catalogues and the present book will be explained in the introduction to the second volume. In two volumes the contents of the previous catalogues, increased by an equal quantity of new material, has been rearranged according to a new system. The third volume, containing illustrations, facsimiles of manuscripts, maps and a general index of names and subjects, is entirely new.

Suicide by Self-Immolation

The third, concluding volume of "Literature of Java" contains Addenda and a General Index, preceded by Illustrations, Facsimiles of Manuscripts, Maps and some Minor Notes, additions which may be of use to students of Javanese literature. The older catalogues of collections of Indonesian manuscripts (Javanese, Malay, Sundanese, Madurese, Balinese), which were written in Dutch, did not offer such additional aids to interested readers. One of the reasons was, that the authors (Vreede, Brandes, van Ronkel, Juynboll, Berg) presupposed a certain knowledge of the Indonesian peoples, their countries and their culture with Dutch students. As often as not the latter, or their families, had lived for many years in Java, and they were destined, when they had completed their studies in The Netherlands, to pass one or more decades of their active life in the tropics in the service of Government, the Christian Missions or the Bible Society. The Archipelago was their second home country. Some familiarity with things Indonesian was found in several circles of society in The Netherlands before the second world war, and information (though not always scholarly and exact) was supplied by quite a number of books and periodicals. For this reason it was thought superfluous to encumber specialistic books like catalogues

of manuscripts with maps and general information which could be found easily elsewhere, for instance in the Dutch "Encyclopaedie van Nederlandsch-Indie". As circumstances have changed it is.

By publishing this handlist on the occasion of the Snouck Hurgronje centenary commemoration the Leyden University Library wishes to express its deep-felt gratitude to that great Arabist and Islamic scholar who directed our Oriental Library Department as Interpres for nearly 30 years and greatly enriched its collections by leaving us his books and manuscripts. Up to now only Snouck Hurgronje's Malay manuscripts were accessible through a printed catalogue made by Prof. dr. Ph. S. van Ronkel. By publishing this handlist on the occasion of the Snouck Hurgronje centenary commemoration the Leyden University Library wishes to express its deep-felt gratitude to that great Arabist and Islamic scholar who directed our Oriental Library Department as Interpres for nearly 30 years and greatly enriched its collections by leaving us his books and manuscripts. Up to now only Snouck Hurgronje's Malay manuscripts were accessible through a printed catalogue made by Prof. dr. Ph. S. van Ronkel. Now the Arabic manuscripts belonging to his collection and numbering nearly three hundred, are being made known for the first time through this list. This is the first catalogue of oriental manuscripts made by a member of our library staff. Formerly the task of describing the oriental manuscripts was entrusted to the Interpres Legati Warneriani and his helpers, or to specialists among the teaching staff of the Leyden University or elsewhere. In 1919 the adiutor Interpretis Dr. C. van Arendonk became a member of the library staff. He had a profound knowledge of Arabic literature but, for reasons set forth in the introduction to this work, he never published a catalogue of the Arabic manuscripts in his keeping. However, the notes left by him are an important contribution towards a new catalogue. They have been extensively used by his successor in compiling this handlist.

Mystical concepts are inspirational, and take a lifetime to fully grasp. I stumbled into icon painting with egg tempera and earth pigments. Discovering Organic Egg Tempera and its Secret Techniques inspired my desire to paint icons. For three decades I have experimented with different forms of prayer. Saints and theologians gave me a solid foundation for meditation; sitting for long periods of time in silence. The awareness of simplicity, of just breathing as a miraculous thing. The concept of ground stone and the inexhaustible dimension of mind made a strong impression upon me. Through meditation I found a new way to commune with the Spirit, and painting images with Mother Earth using egg tempera. If you can grasp the inter-relationship of flesh and spirit in any one aspect of your life, then it is possible to see it run like an electrical current through all of life.

The History and Art of the Russian Icon from the X to the XX Centuries

Icon painting was the ultimate expression of Orthodox Christian art. At its zenith for over 500 years and exemplified by Ukranian artists, the first icons studiously obeyed the rules of Orthodox Christianity. This concise and illustrated history covers the period from the 11th century to the 18th century.

Recovering the Icon

Archimandrite Sophrony (Sergei Sakharov) (1896-1993) has a unique place among artists. He studied and started his career as a painter in abstract and figurative fields in Russia. Later, he exhibited in the Salons of Paris. After becoming an Orthodox monk on Mount Athos, he began painting icons. Later in life he founded his own monastery in Essex, England where he developed his icon painting and created several large murals. This catalogue mainly comprises works from the last period.

The Technique of Icon Painting

The Rena Andreadis icon collection is one of the best known private collections of its kind. It contains Greek icons ranging from the 14th to the 18th century, covering a wide geographical area from Constantinople and mainland Greece to Crete and the Ionian islands. Among them are celebrated works which have frequently been on display to specialists and the general public in exhibitions both in Greece and abroad, and others which are still unknown. The subject matter of the works is particularly varied, combining the most widespread and popular subjects of portable icon painting with others, more unusual, which were dominant in particular regions and periods. From every point of view the Andreadis collection offers a panorama of Greek portable icons and an opportunity to discover the elements they have in common and the multiformity of expression which distinguishes them. It is a

challenge which can only be met by linking the works to the equally confused and complex historical path of Hellenism throughout the same centuries.

Masterpieces of Russian Painting

The Byzantine Iconography book, highlights the development of iconography through the ages, and its spiritual connotations. The particular elements of the Byzantine style are described as well as the characteristic method of presenting perspective and color application to create tridimensional effects. Some of the oldest and best known icons are shown; and how latter painters rendered the prototype maintaining the identity of the original subject. The second part of the book is a painter's manual with detailed instructions on the several steps required to paint icons, including how to prepare the gesso board, transfer of image, application of multiple color layers and application of gold leaf backgrounds.
